
"The Lord is close to the broken-hearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit." Psalm 34:18

It was a softball.

That's what Brian Tomlinson thought as he searched our small chapel for what could have put a jagged hole in the robe of Jesus in the stained glass window above the altar.

In Brian's long tenure (20-plus years) as the chair of Trustees, this was the seventh broken stained glass window.

Yes, we have insurance, but what kind of person does this? While we don't know for sure, we can imagine that it is someone with a broken heart and a broken spirit.



Dani Johnson-Cork remembers her mother, a civil rights leader who influenced her own daughters to pursue justice and as she taught what it means to live in a broken world.

"My mom, Miriam, also lovingly known as "Mimi," was born in Birmingham, Alabama. While a college student in North Carolina, at the inception of the Civil Rights Movement, Mimi took an active role in nonviolent assembly in Charlotte, Atlanta, and Birmingham." She helped integrate lunch counters and she was a speech writer with Dr. King and Medgar Evers.

Comfort can also be as simple as a visit and a smile. David Fraser brought comfort in the form of See's Candy to some of our our members who are at home because of age or illness. At Christmas he hand delivered boxes of chocolate to nine people who have not been able to get to church.

"It was surprising to me how moved I felt because they were so grateful to see that we remembered them," he said.

David wants to expand the "Caring Ministry" of our church to make sure people don't feel forgotten. Maybe you will feel called to help him.

As Mike Alfred looked at the damaged window on a Sunday morning, he mourned the loss. But he saw it as a metaphor. We are all broken people, and yet God's grace repairs us. And our welcoming to others can repair those people as well.

Our window will be good as new in the next few months, like others before it. We will pay our deductible, and we will get it to experts who will remake those crushed pieces and press the design back together again.

That is what we can do, together, as we see a flaw in the world. Pick up that gift card, or visit at the hospital or take a casserole to someone in mourning.

Pastor Mateo Mamea, our former youth leader, will be our speaker on Sunday, March 10 and we will send him off to his church in Borrego Springs with gift cards and hygiene kits to be used in a ministry at the border with Mexico. As desperate people wait for asylum hearings, they are cold and hungry and they need to brush their teeth. They will feel God's love through us.

With our God, it is the little things that build up into a better world, a better and more beautiful design.

Let us listen for the next nudge from God to fix our broken world.

Thank you for all you are doing in the world. God sees you working. Just keep going.

Kevin Simpson has been a member of FUMCOR since 1984. Kevin is the coordinator at FUMCOR of the annual CROP Walk for Hunger and he makes coffee and sets up the welcoming table after church.

Kevin was born in Sturgis, Kentucky. Raised a Presbyterian, but his visited the Methodist church with his grandmother and in college was most often attending a Methodist Church. When he came to Riverside to join the Chemistry faculty at UC Riverside he was drawn to FUMCOR because of its commitment to missions and social causes such as hunger and homelessness.

He participated in the CROP Walk first, and then took over leadership from Rudy Ruddell. Kevin recruits FUMCOR walkers, provides them with information about collecting sponsors, and provides support and encouragement on the day of the walk. Starting last year, FUMCOR has hosted the walk at our church. Many churches throughout Riverside participate in the walk. Volunteers register the walkers, collect the donations and tally the results for each team. They also provide refreshments.

Kevin started making coffee as a member of the newly formed Faith and Fellowship Committee in the mid-1990s. This took on a greater meaning for Kevin when he learned about the United Methodist Committee on Relief's Coffee Project, which started in 2002, to provide support for small farmers throughout the world. This support continues at FUMCOR through the purchase of "Fair Trade" coffee through Equal Exchange, an organization that buys directly from small-scale farmer cooperatives.

Kevin has served on numerous committees and projects during his years at FUMCOR. Kevin says that he has stayed involved because there are so many ways to serve. Kevin believes that there is a committee, a mission or an activity that would be just right for any church member to participate in. Kevin says, "It's a matter of finding your niche. Find that thing you find especially rewarding that allows you to express your faith."



Lighten Up for Lent (musically speaking)

Now that the Christmas season is but a manic memory and we drift dolefully toward the impending penitence of Lent, we must ask ourselves, "Is there humor in organ music?" Yes, Virginia, there is!

Come to FUMCOR at 7 pm Saturday, March 2 and you'll hear a centuriesspanning spectrum of musical madness proving that, indeed, organ composers often have a sense of humor and aren't afraid to use it.

The concert will include works by big names in classical music, such as Franz Joseph Haydn, who offers a tittering tribute to gossiping women (sexism was okay back then), and Johann Pachelbel (of "canon" fame), who pays homage to the bird with the most unimaginative call in the forest. Other selections on the program respectfully parody the styles of classical A-listers, answering such urgent questions as "What would 'Bolero' sound like if Mozart had written it?" and "Would J. S. Bach have won the Grammy for best soundtrack if he had composed the score for a certain Peter Sellers movie?" And somehow that prescient Mr. Bach seems to have written a trio based on a Jerome Kern tune from 1939!

And what of the least talented of Papa Bach's 20-odd children, P.D.Q. Bach? In honor of the death, on January 16, of Peter Schickele, the scholar who spent decades tirelessly unearthing and championing the Bachian black sheep's oeuvre, the program will feature P.D.Q.'s "Three Chorale-based Piecelets," which are strange and, at times, nearly unplayable arrangements of highly unlikely cantus firmi.

Several animals, including a donkey, a squirrel, a wonky fish, an overheated songbird, and some trenchant hamsters, will make an appearance, and you'll hear a wedding march that every organist wishes he could play, when confronted with a bridezilla, without jeopardizing his paycheck. Along the way, you'll also encounter a "Suite for St. Wiesel-Popp," a "Hornpipe Humoresque," a "Ragtime Toccata," a 12-bar blues played solely with the feet (pun intended), and a "Birthday Suit(e)."

As always, the concert is free, and a free-will offering will be collected to support the Organ Dedicated Fund. Imminent maintenance projects for our magnificent instrument include releathering wind chests for the pedal division (the home of most of the nonfunctioning pipes) and replacing all the contacts on the pedalboard (a major effort). Later on, as the releathering transitions to the great division (the middle keyboard), we'll fix a leaking air reservoir, replace the tattered screen between the pipes and the chancel (suggestions regarding the new screen's color are welcome), and rehabilitate some damaged reed pipes. Those are currently the highest-priority projects, and your continuing contributions are deeply appreciated!
