
Bringing Peace With Justice to the World

I am happy that in the most recent General Conference, United Methodists voted overwhelmingly to remove the language that prevented LGBT people from being ordained or marrying in the church. At the same time, the General Conference recognized that regional and local control is best. There is still much to do to create pathways for all people to participate in the ministries of the church, and there are significant differences in the laws and traditions of different countries.

Did you know that the United Methodist Church contains a multitude of political and theological viewpoints? We want you to feel welcome at our church, and we want to walk all together toward peace with justice, and toward a world that is more like what God intended for creation.

Here in our congregation we want people of faith to have many ways to engage in concrete actions that make the community a more just and loving place. We feed the hungry, support mission projects, offer comfort to those who are suffering. We encourage everyone to participate in actions that protect God's creation and advocate for the oppressed. We invite you to join us as we serve as the working hands and dancing feet of our Lord in the world.

We partner with our local chapter of Family Promise to help families with shelter, food and funds to help them achieve sustainable independence.

United Women in Faith (UWF) frequently fund microloans through Kiva. With relatively small amounts of money, Kiva can help entrepreneurs start and grow their businesses. UMW supports women owned businesses, and reinvests all repaid loans into new businesses. They have given more than 100 loans so far.

Peace with Justice (cont.)

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) seeks to alleviate suffering caused by disasters that strike anywhere in the world. With a philosophy that "communities own their recoveries," UMCOR acts quickly to support local efforts to accomplish immediate relief and long-term recovery while providing for volunteers to offer compassionate ministry in the aftermath of disasters.

We partner with our fellow Methodists at Wesley UMC on Arlington to staff a drive thru and walk up pantry and homeless outreach program every Friday from 9 to 10:30 am. It is called the HOPE Room.

Gifts of rabbits, bees, sheep, goats and heifers are part of an international effort to provide living gifts that keep on giving. This congregation has operated the Heifer International booth at the Alternative Gift Fair for more than 40 years.

United Women in Faith (UWF) supports a high school girl with tuition, books, and uniforms at Padhar School in Madhya Pradesh, India.

Meals on Wheels was founded at First United Methodist Church and continues to operate here as a fully functioning non profit organization. Volunteer drivers take low cost meals to seniors or others in need of a steady delivery of food.

I'm looking forward to joining with Greg Laird and Pastor Kim at Annual Conference in Los Angeles June 12 to 15 to vote on issues related to our region of The United Methodist Church. It is called the California-Pacific Annual Conference. We hope to represent you well as we open the doors of opportunity to all, distribute resources more equitably, and provide better care for persons in need.

Peace with Justice Sunday was this past Sunday, but you can still donate through the church office. Make sure they know your intent for the money. We will always try to honor that.


Summer is Coming!

Lee Ann and Daryl Have a Flair for the FUMCOR Mission

When you think about the stalwart, standout members of this church, Lee Ann Salmon's name jumps out. Lee Ann and her husband Daryl are a hardworking team, but they make it look easy. Both have served on or led numerous church committees and have committed a tremendous amount of time and energy to our church, its mission, and its service to the community.

Lee Ann arrived first. She moved from Colorado to Riverside in August, 1976 with her family. "We came to FUMCOR through the preschool. We had no family here. We needed a family!" she said. Once there, people who worked at the preschool invited them to church. Shirley Parks, Carol Stalder, Bill and Marion Wolter, Nata Lea Whiffen, Lynn Ashworth, Libby Gabel and Ruby Gregory were all influential. In 1985, the preschool director invited Lee Ann to teach, and in three short years she took over as director of FUMPS. She loved working with the children and seeing their growth, so she took classes at RCC, UCR and Chaffey College to complete the credentialing requirements. Lee Ann led the preschool until 2016 and continues to serve on the preschool Board of Directors. When her boys were teens she was an active volunteer parent for the UMYF group.

Lee Ann met Daryl in Riverside when he came to repair her air conditioning unit. They married in August, 2001 in the FUMCOR sanctuary. They added their children into a big blended family and they worked together to guide their growing group through jobs and moves and children. They have 9 grandchildren so far.





Lee Ann currently leads the Outreach Committee, putting on Bye Bye Summer Bash, Breakfast with Bunny and Santa's Workshop. She has served on Staff Parish Relations, Finance, Worship, Education, Church Council, and she chaired the first Fall Festival in 2016. She has found an outlet for her background in Interior Design by working with the Altar Decor Team. She and Daryl have started the Empty Nester's Potluck to draw in people who might want to eat together on a Saturday night and play games and converse. The next one is June 15.

For Lee Ann, the joy is in the helping. She was one of the first people to partner with Wesley UMC for hunger and homeless ministries, bringing volunteers from First UMC to distribute clothing and food and even household goods to people in need. We get to thank Lee Ann for bringing Daryl into the fellowship, and for all the wonderful work he has done over the years too, making repairs, stringing lights, ushering, driving, welcoming with a smile.

FUMCOR is blessed to have them both, taking on the jobs that need to get done, building alliances and friendships, serving God, the community of the faithful, and those in need.
