

### Giving is Up -- Thank You!



What GOOD NEWS! Our 52 pledging church members along with non-pledging church members, and others have given more in the first six months of 2024 than was given in same period in 2023. And, even with increased expenses in 2024, our income has so far exceeded our expenses. Along with pledged and unpledged giving, facilities income so far has been a surprise and exceeded our expectations. We used the remainder of our Employee Retention Tax Credit in the first five months of 2024 (shown under "Other" income below along with other sources) and that, combined with other income, meant that we have not had to dip into our trust accounts yet. We are in good shape thanks to our members' generosity and good planning by the Board of Trustees, Finance Committee and staff.



# A Woman for All Seasons: Sophie Weiss

You've seen Sophie Weiss helping take the collection on Sunday mornings and working the dishwasher after Lenten Soup Suppers and United Methodist Men's lunches. Did you know that Sophie is also on the Board of Trustees and serves on the Church and Society Committee?

Sophie is always ready and willing to help. Super intelligent, engaging, ebullient and quick to laugh, dedicated, always willing to help and multi-talented – Sophie is a woman for all seasons.

Sophie came to FUMCOR with her mom, Kate Hunter, from Escondido and joined the church in 2013. Her mom is now a pastor in the Cal-Pac UMC Conference.

Sophie was active in the youth program through high school. She got her associates degree at Cottey College, out-of-state, which meant we only saw her occasionally at Christmas and during summer breaks. But in 2021 she returned to Riverside after completing her bachelor's degree in Physics at Coe College in Iowa, and began a doctoral program at UC Riverside. She's now in her fourth year of a Ph.D. program in Material Science and Engineering. Sophie still has dreams of a career in teaching that employs her love of Physics. By the way, she also did a research internship at Brown University, an lvy League college.

Sophie has many interests and talents. She will be going back to Italy this September for a second art seminar in portrait painting after completing one in figure painting a year ago. When Church and Society began exploring how the church could save money on water and landscaping and also be more ecologically responsible, Sophie offered her artistic talent. She did a

concept painting of the church grounds showing how waterwise landscaping could transform our campus. That drawing may still galvanize the church to further action on this issue.

The demands of a doctoral program haven't kept Sophie away from church. While in the youth program at FUMCOR Sophie began giving back. She washed dishes and volunteered to help at many events. She continues to help out in the kitchen whenever she can.

When Brian Tomlinson, Chair of the Board of Trustees approached Sophie to consider becoming a trustee, it did not take much convincing. Sophie appreciates how much she's learned about the inner workings of the church and what it takes to keep our church buildings and grounds well maintained. She has enjoyed learning about the complexities of our finances. And, she has been engaged in exploring bringing solar energy and ecological landscaping renovations to our campus.

Sophie is a woman of science with a passion for Physics. Has this challenged her faith? Sophie says she has been surrounded by people of faith in both her undergraduate work and while working on her doctorate. Hindi's, Muslims, Jews, and Christians have been peers, professors, and mentors. She says that knowledge is not a hinderance to faith. Rather knowing brings you to a more expansive understanding of our world, the nature of its being, and a deeper appreciation of its creator and sustainer. For Sophie, the fundamental aspect of faith is how we interact with one another. Her interactions with everyone she meets testifies to her faith – warm, caring, spirited and joyous.





# Creation Care is Our Call

Caring for the Creation is a high priority for the United Methodist Church. At the Cal-Pac Annual in June we resolved to be good Stewards of Creation, including fighting for cleaner sources of energy to slow climate change and the fires, storms and droughts it brings.

FUMCOR is faithfully answering God's call to action. For instance:


- All chandelier lights in the sanctuary have been converted to energy efficient LED lights
- Long florescent tube lights are being replaced with LEDs as they burn out;
- We recycle cans, paper, cardboard and certain plastics.
- Trustees are researching how to go solar, with proposals received from three companies. This will be an expensive upfront capital expenditure, but with utility savings down the line to recoup the costs.
- Church investments support one fossil fuel company, but that could be reevaluated.

Now, turning to you. Have you thought about changing how you care for our magnificent planet? Here are a few ideas:

- Buy fewer things. Shop at thrift stores or participate in Buy Nothing groups online.
- Carpool when you can, or walk or bike.
- Change to Energy Star LEDs for all your light bulbs
- Buy appliances that are Energy Star. As you upgrade a car or an HVAC system think about the greenest technologies.
- Too hot? Install a ceiling fan or a whole house fan.
- Plant trees for shade and because they are the most efficient way to pull carbon from the atmosphere.
- Wash clothes in cold water and use the sun to dry your laundry.
- Compost your kitchen waste, or follow trash barrel waste guidelines.
- Lobby your government for greener policies. Make sure you are an educated voter.
   Our actions are a reflection of faith. Recognize that Creation Care is an integral part of our

# Your Organ Ponations at Work! By Robert Phillips, organist

Thanks to your generous contributions to the Organ Dedicated Fund, our organ technician, Sean O'Neal, and his crew have undertaken major repairs of our magnificent instrument. On July 25, he carted the pedalboard off to Seal Beach for a complete refurbishment, including replacement of all the contacts, which, like many things that are 67 years old, were failing with annoying regularity.

Back in the sanctuary, Sean redid all the pedal wiring in the console, allowing plenty of slack so that the pedals can now be pulled out and worked on without cutting the wires. At the top of this article you can see the console in see–thru mode and with its base dismantled, and the pedal array with its spiffy new contacts in Sean's workshop. It's terrific to be able to play any pedal and hear a sturdy, solid tone, rather than pathetic sputtering or nothing at all.

Of the organ's three keyboards, the middle one is the "Great" manual. The stops assigned to it provide the foundation for accompanying congregational singing and are among the loudest on the instrument. The "Great" pipes sit atop two wind chests. Directly beneath each pipe is a leather pouch mounted on a pouch rail, a wooden strip with holes in it. Most of the "Great" pipes have original leather from 1957, and the dry, brittle cowhide is flaking and failing with frightful frequency, having long surpassed its normal lifespan.

Replacing the leather is a precise and painstaking process. Sean suggested that we releather the two "Great" chests separately, so that half the stops will be usable while the other half are in his shop for two weeks.

On August 21, Sean and his crew removed all the pipes from the first wind chest and took the pouch rails

to his shop. The long-awaited "Great Releathering" has begun!

Of course, all of this work will make a substantial dent in our Organ Dedicated Fund, so it's time for another concert! Mark your calendars for 7 pm Saturday, Oct. 26, when we will present our annual Halloween organ spectacular. There's no title or theme yet, but I'm practicing some new pieces, including a gigantic and grandly gothic toccata requested by one of our church members. It should be a fun evening, and if the mood strikes you, wear a costume! October's Messenger will contain further details.
