New Window Dedicated

Look up as you leave the sanctuary via the back door to the patio to take in a new gift to our church, a 150th Anniversary Memorial stained glass window dedicated on Sept. 7 by Loretta Cudney and her family in honor of David Cudney.

This window took some excellent committee work. We brainstormed what to include to represent God's creation, and how to honor our church history and our existing windows. The hands around the globe represent God's hands on the world, but also our hands in the world.

Lyn Knowles chaired the committee and during discussions Loretta Cudney felt called to dedicate it to her husband.

Mike Alfred helped us understand the history of the church's existing windows and Greg Laird and Brian Tomlinson installed the window with help from Adamms stained glass in Santa Monica.

The United Women of Faith helped us celebrate afterward with an ice cream social. Artist David Lines said he used a little bit of antique glass in the piece as well as new glass, to reflect the 150th anniversary of the church and the focus on the future.

"Butterflies embody transformation and the beauty of difference; the hummingbird evokes resilience, joy, and the interdependence of all living things; and the encircling hands represent community, care, and our collective responsibility to one another," David Lines wrote.

The window was dedicated to David Cudney, a plant expert at UCR and a pilot.

"Dave admired all the stained glass windows in this church, so my family felt this was a good way to honor him," Loretta said. "His love of flight is represented by the kestrel hawk, which frequently flies out of the bell tower of our church and in fact did on the day of his funeral."

David Cudney worked on many church committees, volunteered with the youth and died in March of 2023. He will always be part of the church in this beautiful gift of the window. Remember to look up!



"While in Ecuador, Allison's years of experience in scouting and her practical knowhow proved invaluable," David Nelson said. "She played a critical role in shopping for team supplies on the ground, often navigating unfamiliar stores and markets to make sure we had exactly what we needed—whether it was work gloves, water jugs, face masks, soap, or snacks. As our official quartermaster and medic, she kept everything organized and flowing smoothly."

UMM President David Leonard said the event will include an opportunity drawing for a bit of Riverside's history, a print that features the Victoria Avenue Bridge image signed by Riverside artist Marty Tobias. It was offered as a keepsake at the time of the 100th anniversary of the bridge.

Cost for the lunch is \$6 per person or \$20 per family. The lunch is open to all.

In an eerily moonlit church, a phosphorescent phantom floats before the brooding façade of the mighty pipe organ. As the apparition's diaphanous digits drift across the timeworn keys, the instrument pours forth otherworldly harmonies of sweetest melancholy. Soon a spectral saxophone adds its lonesome wail to the lamentation, telling tragic tales of faithless lovers and of distant, mournful train whistles echoing through the darkness.

Is the church truly haunted? Why, no, it's just "Boos in the Night," our annual Halloween organ concert. To witness this supernatural spectacle firsthand, come to our sanctuary at 7 pm on Saturday, Oct. 25. As you may have guessed, our organist will be joined by virtuoso saxophonist Jeff Benedict in a jazzy rendition of the title tune. Other special guests include sopranos Yvonne Flagg and Kris Lovekin, as well as an intrusion of insects in a terrifying tribute to the recently retired Dr. Demento. The program features a centuries-spanning selection of spooky songs, ranging from a classic by Edvard Grieg to melodies inspired by Shakespeare (The Tempest and A Midsummer Night's Dream), from marching gargoyles to movie music (Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest),

from Gregorian chant to television themes (including the snappy audience-participation favorite from The Addams Family). Be prepared to don your dancing shoes and moonwalk to Michael Jackson's "Thriller." And no Halloween extravaganza would be complete without some Ghoultide Carols and Johann Sebastian Bach's "Toccata and Fugue in D Minor." Wear a costume if you like (but do wear something). There is no charge for the event, and a freewill offering will be collected for the Organ Dedicated Fund as we continue the refurbishment of our magnificent Aeolian–Skinner.
