Also, your committee chairs will be gathering Nov. 16 for a Charge Conference that wraps up the year and approves the plans for the coming year. We will be welcoming our friends from Corona and Wesley UMC to join us in the Fellowship Hall and our friends from Highgrove, Grace and Moreno Valley UMC will be meeting also on our campus. Afterward, we will share a potluck together. Rev. Roy Riggs will be presiding over some of it and he promises to get us done with business quickly so we can enjoy the fellowship together.

Some of the reason we meet together like this with other United Methodist congregations is because we are a connectional church. We believe that we are stronger together than we are apart. When we pool our resources and communicate regularly, we can be more impactful as we address the struggles of this broken world.

Boos in the Night is a Hit

Glowing ghosts, ghoulish jack-o-lanterns, and a smoking cauldron set the mood for "Boos in the Night," our Oct. 25 Halloween organ concert. Clever costumes abounded among the attendees, who witnessed musical presentations ranging from the comically ridiculous to the jazzily sublime.

As game two of the World Series was well underway, saxophonist and Dodgers devotee Jeff Benedict knocked one out of the park with his soulful rendition of "Blues in the Night." Yvonne Flagg offered a chilling Gregorian chant about Judgment Day and a solemn Shakespearean song about the terrors of the midnight hour.

After intermission, the audience was stunned when six gigantic cockroaches burst out of the choir room. Before anyone could find a can of Raid, the insect pests danced the Macarena and generally ran amok. Then they swarmed at the front of the chancel, providing backing vocals and hilarious moves as Kris Lovekin sang "The Cockroach That Ate Cincinnati" in the guise of a horror-movie fan describing the scariest film she's ever seen. The audience responded most enthusiastically to this bit of musical mayhem. Many thanks to the dyspeptic roaches (Margie Baillod, Steve Kerrick, Greg Laird, Josh Ponnuraju, Leslie Tomlinson, and Jennifer Walker) and special thanks to Kris, who had a T-shirt custom-made for the occasion. The shirt depicts a terrifying movie poster for "The Cockroach That Ate Cincinnati," complete with a review from Rolling Stone, even though no such film about the ravenous roach was ever made. Scary organ music about Davy Jones (the ghost pirate, not the Monkee), marching gargoyles, and a Shakespearean monster complemented classics by Edvard Grieg, César Franck, and Johann Sebastian Bach. All in all, the audience was subjected to a huge variety of unsettling sights and sounds, yet they generously contributed \$1,850 to the Organ Maintenance Dedicated Fund as of press time. This amount will be matched by an exceedingly beneficent anonymous donor.

Thanks to these gifts, we will continue the repair and restoration of our magnificent pipe organ so it can serve this congregation for decades to come.

United Methodist Men Sunday, Nov. 9



If These Women Could Talk...

The United Methodist Men will offer a program on the hidden impacts of violence at 11:15 am Sunday, Nov. 9. Cost for a delicious lunch is \$6 per person or \$20 per family. All are welcome.

Riverside author Jo Scott-Coe is a Professor of English at Riverside City College, where she was named RCC's Distinguished Faculty Lecturer in part for her archival research in histories of mass violence and abuse.

She has been a featured guest and essayist in the media, including Time magazine, Salon, Houston Matters, the Jon and Ken Show, The Press-Enterprise and many others.

Unheard Witness: The Life and Death of Kathy Leissner Whitman (University of Texas Press) is Scott-Coe's third book. It foregrounds a young woman's experience of domestic abuse, resistance, and hope until her husband Charles Whitman stabs her to death and goes to commit the shocking mass shooting at the University of Texas at Austin in 1966—now approaching its 60th memorial anniversary.

Public violence often follows violence in the home, yet such private crimes continue to be erased in the public imagination as they are overshadowed by the murder of strangers.

Scott-Coe's previous books are *Teacher at Point Blank* and *MASS: A Sniper, a Father, and a Priest,* a groundbreaking exploration of the relationship between the 1966 UT Austin sniper and his priest mentor, Rev. Joseph "Gil" Leduc, who was later accused of sexual abuse by the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston.

In 1966, Kathy Leissner Whitman was a 23-year-old teacher and writer who left essays and letters that allow a rare glimpse into how one woman described and sought to change her life in the face of a coercive, controlling and violent partner. The book has helped readers grasp the link between domestic abuse and mass shootings.

When she is not writing or teaching, Scott-Coe enjoys reading, experimenting with recipes, biking, and traveling with her husband, Justin Coe.

Scott-Coe occasionally facilitates community writing workshops for the Inlandia Institute in Southern California.

The United Methodist Men continue a Friday Prayer Breakfast at 7 am in Mary's Kitchen. All men are invited to join for fellowship, faith, coffee, donuts, and pastries.




